Some of these books are written by non-Adventist authors and, therefore, may not fully reflect Seventh-day Adventist philosophy. However, we believe there is value in these books which have been selected to inspire, bring insight, and challenge your thinking.

To secure a Professional Growth Certificate for the 2025-2026 school year, you should read the four issues of the *Journal of Adventist Education*, at least one book from Group B, and at least four additional books from two or more other headings. Some books may have been listed under two headings and will count for either group. One book of your choice, which could be classified under any of these headings, may be substituted for a book on this list.

GROUP A – READERS CHOICE

God’s Character and the Last Generation, Moskala and Peckham, *Pacific Press*, 2018, 286 pages

Warning! This book is a collection of essays by noted SDA theologians on the meaning and status of Adventist eschatology, and the “understanding, lifestyle and choices of the people who live in this generation.” The warning label is more of an alert for some heavy-lift, theology focused on what the authors refer to as “Last Generation Theology (LGT).” Considerable effort is presented by the authors to analyze this concept in light of last day issues, including perfection of character, sanctification, the human condition, freedom of choice, grace vs. keeping the law and many others. The overall goal, beyond the extensive, well developed and presented theological depictions is an attempt to help all of us to understand the different positions regarding Christian living in the end time. It’s a fabulous read!

Embracing Messy Leadership: How the Experience of 20,000 School Leaders Can Transform You and Your School, Alyssa Gallagher and Rosie Connor, *ASCD*, 2024, 175 pages

This is a book about improving leadership in today’s schools. The focus and what makes the book an easy, practical experience is its organization and structure. In addition to the “Messy Leadership Model”, each chapter contains information in chart and graph form for helping the reader create a sustained shift in leadership style and practice. A few samples include the following:

- A key challenge (providing a guide to what the chapter talks about)
- Case studies that illustrate how other school leaders have dealt with a given issue.
- Tips and “aha moments” from the school leaders
- Go-do actions that prompt the reader to apply the lessons learned.

Gallagher and Conner were entirely appreciative and conveyed support for these ideas that were based on real-world experiences of over 20,000 school leaders in many states and different types of schools. They were unapologetic to conclude throughout the book that “Today’s schools are MESSY and require school personnel who can become MESSY leaders.”

Mission Drift: The Unspoken Crisis Facing Leaders, Charities, and Churches, Peter Freer and Chris Horst, *Bethany House Publishers: A Division of Baker Publishing Group*, 2014, 219 pages

Freer and Horst have written a remarkable book that is so glaringly accurate regarding current challenges that specifically face Christian organizations. Mission Drift, as the authors call it, describes what happens when the organization (church, school, club or social entity, etc.) veers away from its intended purpose toward something else. They further contend with an abundance of research, observation and their own personal experiences over the years that mission drift happens to all faith-based organizations. The classic example they describe is Harvard University which was founded originally to educate ministers. Without reservation, the world recognizes Harvard as one of, if not the grandest, wealthiest, and most highly respected educational institutions in the world which is a long way from its original purpose. This mission movement, according to the authors, can be either positive or negative depending on many factors. They describe with amazing accuracy how important it is for leaders to recognize and understand this phenomenon in order to put in motion plans and procedures to remain “mission true” or to go with the inevitable flow. This is an important book with well-written, eye-opening, and fascinating ideas and concepts for all educators to read!

The Principal’s Guide to Conflict Management, Jen Schwanke, *ASCD*, 2024, 162 pages

Schwanke traces her interest in conflict management back to a time in her early days of teaching when she and a fellow teacher had personal issues. The principal came to her and encouraged her to work out her issues with the other teacher. That encounter as well as reading about and witnessing many issues of conflict within the school environment prompted her to research and write this book. Schwanke acknowledges and the research demonstrates that conflict is inevitable as long as we as human beings are charged with implementing the education enterprise. The challenge, according to the author, is not to run away from it or prevent it from happening, but to manage it with purpose, experience, and well-crafted management practices. One of the many thoughtful strategies presented is more training so that principals know whether, or not, to intervene in conflict issues.

Unmasking The Beasts of Revelation 13 and 17, Timothy R. Jennings, M.D., *Come and Reason Ministries*, 2022, 83 pages

This is the first of two magazine style publications written by Timothy Jennings, President of Come and Reasons Ministries. The magazine style format fits strategically into our quick, easy to read, modern-day lifestyle. It is a dynamically written and beautifully illustrated magazine focused on two chapters of the book of Revelation, one of the SDA churches' basic prophetic principles. There is little question that the book of Revelation with its emphasis on beasts, angels, lampposts, and other symbols is difficult to understand. In fact, many feel that it is so difficult that they avoid it altogether. This format, however, makes Revelation understandable featuring innovative methods pictures and captions. This issue also includes an explanation of the symbolism of beasts, seas, waters horns and numbers. With this magazine format and innovative features, it's a must read.

Daring to Ask for More: Divine Keys for Answered Prayer, Melody Mason, *Pacific Press*, 2014, 304 pages

Her work has focused on people at all levels of life and experience from the highest levels of church organization to those struggling on the streets of our cities. After organizing and preparing a series of successful programs and materials for the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists on prayer and Bible Study, Melody has undertaken this book on prayer. Her focus is on presenting prayer as a "divine key to success in life and ministry." As simple as this quote may appear, Melody's bigger proposition is that this prayer key is more valuable than all the resources at the disposal of magistrates and kings. Furthermore, she asserts that this prayer key, freely available to our open hands, has the promise to open up a whole new world of life and endless possibilities in our prayer lives.

This is the second of the two innovative magazine style publications from Tim Jennings. This edition features topics of universal interest, including "Why Hasn't Jesus Come Back", and "Why Did Jesus Have to Die if Not for Legal Reasons." The articles in this edition focus on ways that

traditional SDA thinking (law focus) may not be applicable for many more modern (grace) perspectives. With a fresh, magazine style format with subtitles, photos, and various print styles, this publication becomes interesting reading. While the magazine style format is new, its author, Tim Jennings is not new to writing, having authored more than 10 books. In addition, Jennings is a board-certified Christian psychiatrist, international speaker and distinguished fellow of the American Psychiatric Association.

What's Best Next: How the Gospel Transforms the Way You Get Things Done, Matt Perman, Zondervan, 2014, 374 pages

The title of this book gives the impression that its focus is marketing or productivity in a business or profit-making sense. The real focus, however, is how to insert God in the forefront of all such ventures. Furthermore, it's about getting things done from a biblical perspective whether it's in business, education or anything worthy of God's involvement. Perman not only prompts the reader to focus on Bible-based thinking, but to place God at the forefront of whatever we attempt to accomplish. For instance, he flips the question of what can we do to please God to what does God want us to do to please Him? The book contains many other examples of how productivity is improved with God's involvement, including twelve myth-busting examples. Perman also uses an abundance of witty humor about his own wins and failures, and world-class research on what makes for success in business or other ventures. Overall, Perman has crafted a masterpiece of writing with practical, God centered productivity concepts. On a five-star rating platform, this book goes over the top as a must read!

GROUP C – SDA CHURCH HISTORY

A Voice to Rouse the Nations: Ellen White and the Growth of Adventist Mission Work, D. J. B Trim, Pacific Press, 2024, 128 pages

This book is a history of Seventh-day Adventist (SDA) mission work through 1915. Author David Trim explores the evolution of the SDA pioneers' beliefs and attitudes. He also introduces some of the early overseas missionaries and examines Ellen White's role in the development and reform of the church's global mission work. It was interesting to note Trim's research pointing out the fact that the SDA church did not initially sanction sending out missionaries. However, that stance changed when Mrs. White began exhorting church leaders to leave their comfortable positions and extend the Lord's work to other countries. From that relatively humble but powerful position from the Church's prophet, the Adventist foreign mission work spread quickly. Author Trim brings this history to life detailing the fact that by 1915, the year of Mrs. White's death, the mission work had become nearly worldwide as she envisioned it to become.

The initial review described this book as history. However, this view changed to the book being more of a devotional book written by one of the SDA church's most prolific authors. George Knight, a retired professor of Church History at Andrews University has written more than 10 books on a wide variety of topics, including Bible luminaries, documentaries, SDA church histories and many others. *Lest We Forget* reintroduces the readers to the pioneers of the SDA church. In addition to its devotional messages, it's an historical approach to the people who struggled to study, learn, and preach the truth of the second coming. These pioneers started out as "Millerites" who lived through the great disappointment to the early days of the beginnings of the SDA church. He furthermore calls them the "spiritual ancestors" of the movement and blends with excellent harmony the struggles of the history of the movement accompanied by scripture which captures the essences of their legacy. This book presents a profound approach of growth and inspiration for anyone, SDA or others seeking to learn and grow spiritually on a daily basis.

Atomic Habits: An Easy and Proven Way to Build Good Habits and Break Bad ones, James Clear, *Avery An Imprint of Penguin Random House LLC*, 2018, 306 pages

Atomic Habits by James Clear has achieved the pinnacle of literary success as a New York Times Best Seller. This is a transformative and motivational self-help book that delves into the science of habit formation and offers practical strategies for creating lasting change. Clear explores how small, incremental changes, or "atomic habits," can lead to significant improvements in one's life. Drawing from psychology and neuroscience, he explains the underlying mechanisms behind habits and provides actionable insights to help readers build good habits, break bad ones, and achieve their goals. John Maxwell, New York Times Bestselling author in many genres is also unquestionably the "Dean" of authors on Leadership. With this book, he solidifies his valued position focusing his talents on leadership development. Maxwell supports his emphasis on the need for developing

leaders based on his decades of experience with supplemental information from research and management theory. In his words the process of leadership development is “hard work, takes a lot of time and never comes to an end.” Even with these challenges, Maxwell makes it worth the effort with his emphasis on his 10 steps to leadership development. This includes identifying them, attracting them to the table, understanding by connecting with them, motivating them to do their best, equipping them with top training, positioning them for major impact, mentoring them as necessary, reproducing their talents, and compounding them for success in any organization. Even for those entities with top leaders, Maxwell contends that it’s good management to review the 10 steps for refinement and closing any weaknesses.

Thriving: 31 Stories on the Impact of Adventist Education, Aimee Saesim Leukert, *Pacific Press*, 2023, 127 pages

This book was written as a “labor of love” according to author Aimee Saesim Leukert, in response to positive years of attending Adventist schools and later to successfully teach in them as well. This love for Adventist education and a yearning desire to know its real-life impact led Aimee to research others who had similar experiences and who were considered to be thriving or successful in their chosen careers or adult lives. After sending out dozens of emails to conferences, universities, and academies, Aimee identified and interviewed people from all walks of life about their early and adult lives, experiences, challenges, and explored the many ways that Adventist education impacted their lives. The result was this book focused on 31 of those individuals, including pastors, physicians, nurses, educators, musicians, a chef, a government contractor and a quilter. The stories were riveting, different and inspiring.

GROUP E – TEACHER’S PERSONAL GROWTH

Rekindle Your Professional Fire: Powerful Habits for Becoming a More Well-Balanced Teacher, Mike Anderson, *ASCD*, 2024, 131 pages

Mike Anderson’s latest book on teacher burnout is an excellent follow-up to one of his earlier books on the well-balanced teacher. His easy going, conversational style makes his burn-out story well adapted to almost every other teacher who has experienced the same things. This includes taking on too many projects, the pressures of testing and negative aspects of standardized test scores, exhaustion, not eating well, lack of exercise and a host of everyday experiences in our modern cookie-cutter, microwave society. All of which lead to his “fire for teaching starting to sputter”, eventually leading to burnout. Anderson’s recipe is a unique play on words, including Recharge your battery (self-care), Recover your swagger (purpose), Rekindle your Professional Fire (autonomy and curiosity), and Refresh Your spirit (belonging and fun).

Teach Happy: Small Steps to Big Joy, Kim Strobel, *Impress, A Division of Dave Burgess Consulting, Inc*, 2024, 137 pages

In this book, Strobel tackles the significant problem of teacher burnout in a new and innovative manner. She substantiates her “happiness” theme with well researched findings of high percentages of stress among today’s teachers even though they “come to work with smiles on their faces.” As a former teacher who experienced panic attacks and burnout herself, she turns the traditional “success first then happiness” model upside down. In other words, she demonstrates that the traditional model of success leading to happiness, does not always work. Instead, Stroebel asserts the opposite that happiness leads to success, leading to her formula of the “Happiness first” formula. Even with these findings, Stroebel shows how Schools play into the success first formula by pushing teachers to take on more projects, the dizzying array of state or national norms, and more emphases on standardized testing. The book is full of positive things to say about the need for rewiring our brains to better understand stress and the best ways to manage burnout.

The Ruthless Elimination of Hurry, John Mark Comer, *Waterbrook*, 2019, 286 pages

This is an awesome, inspirational book about how we can slow down our busy, twenty-first century existence by purposefully and prayerfully eliminating HURRY in our lives. Comer, who is already a bestselling author, pastor, teacher and contented family man, sets the tone for the entire book by opening with the words of Jesus as found in Matthew 11:28-30, “Come to me all you who are weary and burdened and I will give you rest.” In addition to practicing the words and ways of Jesus for finding rest in Him, Comer asserts through ample research findings how we are all just too busy to rest. More about Jesus’ examples of restful living were included in Part III of Comer’s book. He calls them practices of spiritual discipline, including “silence, solitude, sabbath, simplicity, and slowing.” At first glance, this seems like a simple, almost deceptive, everything starting with an “s”, formula, but it soon hit me as a powerful gut punch for simplifying your life. In short, this book is a great read and start toward an unhurried life!

What Can I Take Off Your Plate: A Structural-and Sustainable-Approach to Countering Teacher Burnout, Jill Handley and Lara Donnelly, *ASCD*, 2024, 165 pages

This is a book about teacher burnout, how to understand and identify it and most importantly, how to prevent and/or manage it. The title is based on synonyms for finding ways to reduce or lighten your workload. The primary focus of the book is for school leaders to treat burnout like the complicated challenge it is and meet it with both focused action and the lasting, sustainable solutions it demands. The authors make a strong case with appropriate research to sustain the fact that the problem of teacher burnout has been around for a long time. Now, they assert that

the problem demands systemic solutions, not just self-care. A wide range of system wide solutions, therefore, are presented, including extensive planning, collaboration, improved communication, scheduling for time to breathe, and many others. The book is a great start to improved understanding and for solving this nagging and growing problem of teacher burnout.

GROUP F – TEACHING AND LEARNING

7 Mighty Moves: Research-Backed, Classroom-Tested Strategies to Ensure K-to-3 Reading Success, Lindsay Kemeny, *Scholastic*, 2023, 160 pages

For teacher, mother, researcher and now writer, Lindsay Kemeny, the debate on the best way to teach reading is over. After extensive research and her own experiences, Kemeny presents in this book, the 7 mighty moves to teach reading using phonics to children, especially for those with dyslexia or similar learning disabilities. The research supports her views that children who understand the relationships between sounds and letters tend to learn to read earlier and with greater understanding and pronunciations. Her *7 Mighty Moves* are written with clarity, practicality, and detail befitting one who has gone beyond the research to actual practice. The easy-to-understand charts, graphs, and pragmatic examples offer new and experienced teachers a realistic method for strengthening phonics use in the classroom.

Every Connection Matters: How to Build, Maintain, and Restore Relationships Inside the Classroom and Out, Michael Creekmore and Nita Creekmore, *ASCD*, 2024, 136 pages

Supported by authoritative research and their own experience as classroom teachers, the Creekmore's make bold statements about the importance of relationships in good schools. While not an easy task, building, cultivating, and sustaining productive and positive relationships in a school building ranks at or near the top of every school leader's list of concerns. With this foundation, the book builds on six key types of relationships: teacher to self, teacher to student, teacher to family, teacher to teacher, teacher to administrator, and teacher to staff. Written with an abundance of easy to read and understand charts and graphs, the authors show how connections (positive and negative) between school stakeholders lead to relationships which after time and experience can yield positive outcomes. Each chapter closes with anecdotal observations and take aways from their individual points of view providing helpful guidance tools and reflective questions to help build, maintain and restore meaningful relationships for all stakeholders.

How Teaching Happens: Seminal Works in Teaching and Teacher Effectiveness and What they Mean in Practice, Paul A Kirschner, Carl Hendrick and Jim Heal, *Routledge, Taylor and Francis Group*, 2022, 353 pages

When something is called “seminal”, you will usually consider it original, groundbreaking and so earth shattering that it will influence everything that comes after it. This book by award winning authors Kirschner and Hendrick accompanied by Jim Heal fits the description about teaching effectiveness. It contains 30 articles from almost all the basic fields of education, including psychology, research, the learning process and various teaching effectiveness studies from noted researchers and authors around the world. The genius of the work is its precise focus on what makes for effective teaching in the classroom and how the research and classroom practice merge. The unique structure of the book allows for in-depth understanding and clarity that makes the relatively ample page length manageable. This easy-to-follow structure guides the reader to **What** each article is about, **Why** you should read it, a brief but encompassing **Abstract**, then, the **Article** itself followed by a listing of **Conclusions** and final **Take_Aways**.

Teaching Montessori Science: 9 Practical Strategies to Engage Children in Hands-on Steam Activities, Jackie Fung Grundberg, *Nova Terra Publishing*, 2024, 220 pages

Grundberg uses a well-known phrase attributed to Benjamin Franklin to give the reader a peek as to its primary focus: “Tell me and I forget. Show me and I remember. Involve me and I understand.” It’s also useful to cite the phrase as an introduction to the world famous and well-respected Montessori Method of teaching science which is the focus of this excellent book. The structure of the book, its contents, examples, charts, graphs, abundant use of photos, end of chapter summaries, etc., all work to present a most unique book. This is a serious “how to do it” masterpiece that provides step by step almost word for word examples and concrete and practical and doable methods for using Montessori methods from an author who admits that she failed science in elementary school. While incorporating many Montessori philosophical and foundational materials, she shows how the average classroom teacher or homeschooler with little or no knowledge about Montessori can utilize those methods and strengthen their classroom teaching.

Teaching with AI: A Practical Guide to a New Era of Human Learning, Jose Antonio Bowen and C. Edward Watson, *American Association of Colleges and Universities and Johns Hopkins University Press*, 2024, 270 pages

With so many recent AI books on the market, a curious reader is somewhat baffled as to the best ones to read. This one, however, as noted in its title, stresses the point to be “a practical guide” which elevates its usefulness and readability. Bowen and Watson go to great lengths to

remain true to their “practical” focus with amazing fidelity. They acknowledge talking with many students in the formation of the book, many of whom admit that writing with AI is not considered cheating. This topic is also dealt with, to greater scrutiny, with viewpoints from teachers who admit to not being up to date about identifying AI or understanding its full impact in the classroom. Throughout the book, the authors stress that teachers must discover how to harness and manage AI as a powerful teaching tool which is already creating “seismic changes in the classroom and beyond.” Finally, the book presents a practical way for teachers who are new to AI to gain confidence in navigating its many challenges and rewards.

GROUP G – UNDERSTANDING STUDENTS

The Anxious Generation: How the Great Rewiring of Childhood is Causing an Epidemic of Mental Illness, Jonathan Haidt, *Penguin Press*, 2024, 385 pages

Just scanning the cover notes of this New York Times Bestseller makes one sit up and take notice. Jonathan Haidt author of several recent bestsellers strikes another homeroom with this most recent book about the epidemic of teen mental illness that has overtaken our nation and caused similar problems around the world. Armed with an abundance of scientific, cultural, and lifestyle data, Haidt provides proof as to how national and international rates for teen depression, anxiety, self-harm, and suicide rose sharply during the early 2000s. Haidt demonstrates with scalpel-like accuracy showing how “play-based childhood” began to decline during the same periods and how it was wiped out by the arrival of “phone-based childhood” which has caused so much concern. This finding alone has opened the collective senses of educators and politicians leading to the need for more research and corrective action regarding this international problem.

The Art of Teaching Children, Phillip Done, *Avid Reader Press*, 2022, 445 pages

Philip Done has created a masterpiece with this book. He begins by using a famous quote by famous writer John Steinbeck, “Great teachers are great artists.” This forms the essence of his work because like a great artist, teachers create and recreate the minds, characters, attitudes and in many cases the basic lifestyles of children. Throughout the book, Done recounts the joys and challenges of 30 plus years of teaching, including the fact that he is “retiring while he still loves the profession”, and that he never wanted to be one of those teachers who “held on” even though they hated it. He uses his years of experience as a classroom teacher with an abundance of humor, wisdom and demonstrated insight into the children, the curriculum, the classroom, the craft, the colleagues, and finally the challenges of the profession. This one is well worth reading!

The Learning Game: Teaching Kids to Think for Themselves, Embrace Challenge, and Love Learning, Anna Lorena Fabrega, *Harriman House*, 2023, 284 pages

The author credits her motivation for writing this book to the hard facts she learned by attending more than 10 schools in 7 countries. During that time, she recounts the case for how she learned to “play the game of school” which translates into pleasing your teachers, following orders, being obedient, sitting up, being quiet, compliant, and pretending to pay attention, etc. From those early school days to her present status as a consultant, author, and critic of modern-day education, Fabrega makes the case for a new approach to teaching and learning. She playfully admits in her opening chapter that she loves teaching and that’s why she quit! With this book, she shares her experiences, insights, and novel approaches for fixing education from the “kids” point of view. This is well worth reading!

The Neurodiversity Edge: The Essential Guide to Embracing Autism, ADHD, Dyslexia, and Other Neurological Differences for Any Organization, Maureen Dunne, *Wiley*, 2024, 324 pages

This is a well-researched and well written book, however, in this reviewer’s opinion, it is not for the faint of heart! The terms used in understanding and identifying neurodiversity are probably applicable for those teachers experienced in special education or other educational specialties. Much of the information would not usually be found within the average teacher’s experience or vocabulary. The author does, however, go into great lengths to define Neurodiversity as a term used to explain the unique ways the human brain works. She also includes useful terminology in the Appendix for easy access to definitions, and explanations of concepts, cognitive typologies, and terms used throughout the book. After describing neurological differences, the author seeks to convince with research, observation, anecdotal evidence, and her own experiences that authentic neurodiversity is not only an essential ideal for every organization, but it allows for a competitive advantage for those willing to delve into and commit to its inclusion.
